
I welcome and offer an invitation to all other Country Network guys for future lunches in the Brisbane/ Gold Coast areas.



How does Paul become his authentic self?

Please let me introduce fellow member, Paul Ward. Sydney born, Paul was raised in a Catholic focused family during the 60s and 70s. Like so many others of that era, Paul felt the need to hide his gay sexuality whilst still keeping an examining eye on the Maroubra Surfies in all their glimmering splendour. And how he longed to jump off the bus and stroll the sexually charged streets of Darlinghurst and Kings Cross!

But the familiar story followed for Paul; aged in his mid 40s, he married a Catholic woman in an effort to 'cure' myself of gay tendencies. It didn't work! They divorced in 2012 and he eventually came out publicly in October 2014 at the age of 60. He quickly discovered gay haunts and social apps such as Grindr, which kept him amused for a couple of years, but he wanted more than they could offer. In 2017, thanks to a mutual friend he was introduced to Cheng via Facebook. Soon after they moved in together in Melbourne where they lived for five years till moving to Caboolture for a warmer climate.



And now over to Paul for him to tell you about his book

The movie Spotlight drew focus to my own situation. Reflecting on my youth as a gay Catholic male, I saw the immense influence of the dominant white Sydney culture of the mid 20th Century, my traditional devout family and the ingrained, no, near intrinsic need to cover-up. The need to deny my own sexuality on one hand but also to deny my openly Catholic practice on the other.

My Memoir "Suffocated by Church - a Gay man's journey to freedom" is my deeply personal account of my life uncomfortably situated in that overarching paradigm as it focuses on my journey from childhood, through adolescence and a turbulent internal struggle to my eventual coming out later in life as a Proud Gay Australian.

I reflect on several stages of my life including: my time as an altar boy, two stints in Catholic monasteries as a teenager, Clerical Sexual Abuse, failed relationships with women - and men, a sojourn to the exotic Papua New Guinea and life in the Sydney Catholic Seminary, all prior to marriage in the Catholic church.

CAMP: Australia's pioneer homosexual rights activists

The Pride movement in Australia began with the founding of CAMP (Campaign Against Moral Persecution) in Sydney in 1970. CAMP's momentum spread quickly to other Australian states, fuelling the first LGBTQI rights marches and firing up political campaigns for changes to oppressive laws and systems. *CAMP: Australia's pioneer homosexual rights activists* brings to life the vital role that CAMP activists played. They inspired and initiated a social movement that continues to this day. Individual members of CAMP from across Australia now tell their own stories and highlight their lived experiences. They speak of the lifechanging support their community offered, at a time when lesbians and gay men were despised by much of society.

Authors Robyn Kennedy and Robyn Plaister were both active members of CAMP NSW during the 1970s. They are 78ers who have stayed involved with the Pride movement. Robyn Kennedy is a former Sydney Gay and Lesbian Mardi Gras board member and current Vice President, Global Outreach and Partnerships with InterPride, the international association of Pride organisers. Robyn Plaister started the first Lesbian Mothers group and coorganised the first Lesbian Teachers Group. She is a current member of 10/40 Matrix, a group organising supportive and educative programs for lesbians over 40.


